

					
<b>EUTHANASIA, PALLIATIVE CARE, AND ELDER CARE</b>	Supported Bill C-7 at 3rd reading, but two MPs opposed the final version after Senate amendments. Generally supports the amendments <sup>1</sup> made in Bill C-7 and wants everyone to have the choice of euthanasia. <sup>2</sup> Supports greater investment in palliative care, <sup>3</sup> and advocates for a national standard and oversight of elder care, as well as more community and home-based care. <sup>4</sup>	Supported Bill C-7 at 3rd reading but unanimously opposed Bill C-7 following Senate amendments. <sup>5</sup> Supports the expansion of euthanasia for patients with chronic conditions that are not terminal. <sup>6</sup> Promises to take profit out of long-term care and to develop national care standards and increased investments. <sup>7</sup> No recent stated position on palliative care. In the past, have stated that access to palliative care is a right. <sup>8</sup>	Introduced and passed Bill C-7 which expands access to euthanasia. All but 2 Liberal MPs supported the Bill at 3rd reading, and a third MP opposed it following Senate amendments. <sup>9</sup> Latest Federal budget includes investments in both euthanasia implementation and improved palliative care. Also allocating more investments toward improved long-term care standards and home care for seniors. <sup>10</sup>	15 Conservative MPs supported Bill C-7 at 3rd reading, while 103 opposed. Unanimously opposed Bill C-7 after Senate amendments. <sup>11</sup> Conservative party policy states that it will not support legislation that would legalize euthanasia. <sup>12</sup> Leader Erin O'Toole has promised that a Conservative government would not revisit the issue. <sup>13</sup> Various MPs advocate for better palliative care instead of expanded euthanasia. Last election, promised to invest in a Framework for Palliative Care. <sup>14</sup>	Opposes euthanasia and assisted suicide and promises to restore protection from euthanasia. Advocates for pain control and palliative care to help patients who are suffering, rather than ending their life. <sup>15</sup>
<b>ABORTION</b>	Promises to oppose any action which would limit access to safe and legal abortion. <sup>16</sup>	Calls for action on reproductive health care and improving access to abortion and contraceptives. Opposes the ability for Provinces to impede abortion in any way. <sup>17</sup>	Committed to protecting access to abortion and making access to abortion and contraceptives more affordable. <sup>18</sup> Supports withholding healthcare funding from Provinces which limit abortion access. <sup>19</sup>	Allows free votes on issues of life but promises that a Conservative government will not introduce legislation to regulate abortion. Condemns sex-selective abortion and opposes funding abortion through foreign aid. <sup>20</sup>	Supports protecting human life from conception. Advocates for Criminal Code amendments to protect pre-born life. Government would remove funding from abortion and provide funding to organizations that support women during crisis pregnancies. <sup>21</sup>
<b>HATE SPEECH</b>	No stated position on hate speech. 1 Green MP voted for Bill C-10 at 3rd reading, and 2 abstained. <sup>22</sup>	Calls for measures to tackle online hate, including regulations on social media platforms and penalties if they do not remove hateful content. <sup>23</sup> Supports legislative reform to combat hate and far right groups in Canada. <sup>24</sup> Propose creating hate crime units in communities throughout Canada, and establishing national standards to identify hate incidents. <sup>25</sup> Unanimously supported Bill C-10 at 3rd reading. <sup>26</sup>	Introduced Bill C-36 which would amend the Criminal Code and the Canadian Human Rights Act to combat hate speech. Also introduced Bill C-10 which would regulate certain online content. Promises to target online hate speech, as well as finding civil remedies for offline hate. <sup>27</sup> Unanimously supported Bill C-10. <sup>28</sup>	Unanimously opposed Bill C-10 and have promised to repeal it. <sup>29</sup> Conservative MPs have stated that Bill C-36 improperly restricts freedom of speech. <sup>30</sup> Supports freedom of speech and expression, and would seek to protect free speech on University campuses. <sup>31</sup>	Promises to defend against Human Rights Commission attacks on free speech and supported the repeal of Section 13 of the Human Rights Act. <sup>32</sup> Strongly opposed to Bill C-10 and C-36. <sup>33</sup>
<b>CONVERSION THERAPY</b>	Promised to ban conversion therapy in the previous election; <sup>34</sup> one Green MP voted in favour of Bill C-6 and the remaining two Green MPs did not vote on the bill's final reading <sup>35</sup>	Party grassroots prioritized a policy banning conversion therapy at their 2021 convention; <sup>36</sup> party is committed to banning conversion therapy; <sup>37</sup> the entire NDP caucus (save one absent member) voted in favour of Bill C-6 <sup>38</sup>	Actively attempted to ban conversion therapy in C-8 and then C-6 since the last election; the entire Liberal caucus (minus three absent members) supported Bill C-6 at its final reading <sup>39</sup>	No official position on conversion therapy; party leader Erin O'Toole opposes conversion therapy but had reservations about Bill C-6; <sup>40</sup> 62 Conservative MPs opposed Bill C-6 and 51 MPs, including O'Toole, supported the bill at final reading <sup>41</sup>	Opposes abusive conversion therapy and supports biblical body-affirming counselling; <sup>42</sup> strongly opposed Bill C-6 <sup>43</sup>
<b>PROSTITUTION</b>	Promised to reform sex work laws in Canada to focus on harm reduction <sup>44</sup>	Party grassroots prioritized a policy to make the decriminalization of prostitution a central element of its election campaign and to table as soon as possible a bill to decriminalize prostitution <sup>45</sup>	Party grassroots prioritized a policy to decriminalize prostitution at their 2018 convention <sup>46</sup> but the Liberal government has not indicated that prostitution is on their political agenda since then	Rejects the concept of legalizing the purchase of sex; supports a plan to target the purchasers of sexual services and third parties who profit from the purchase of sex; <sup>47</sup> introduced Canada's current legislation regulating prostitution in 2014 <sup>48</sup>	Strongly opposes the legalization or decriminalization of prostitution; supports Canada's current prostitution law <sup>49</sup>
<b>PORNOGRAPHY</b>	Supports increasing resources to the RCMP so that they can combat the online sexual exploitation of children through child pornography <sup>50</sup>	Supports efforts to protect women from sexual violence and online exploitation such as greater regulation of online pornography sites <sup>51</sup>	Led the Standing Committee on Access to Information, Privacy, and Ethics' investigation into online pornography sites; <sup>52</sup> otherwise no stated position on pornography	Opposed to the possession of child pornography; <sup>53</sup> some individual MPs have actively supported greater regulation on the distribution of online pornography <sup>54</sup>	Supports the stringent regulation of pornography platform if not the complete prohibition on the distribution of pornography <sup>55</sup>
